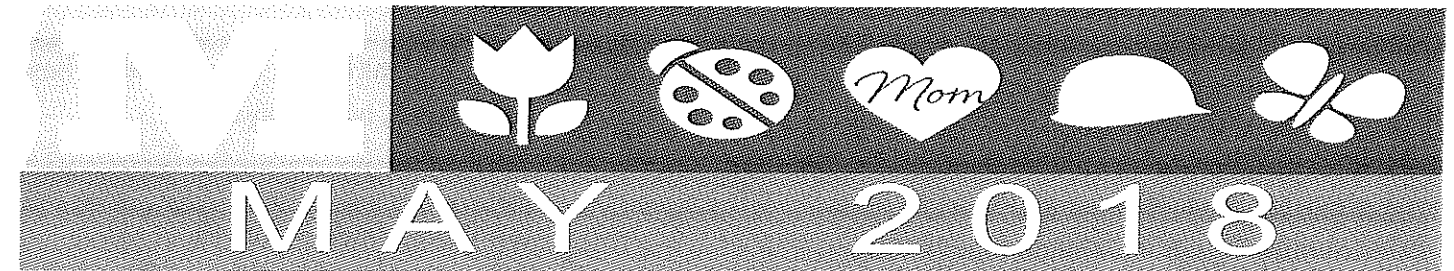

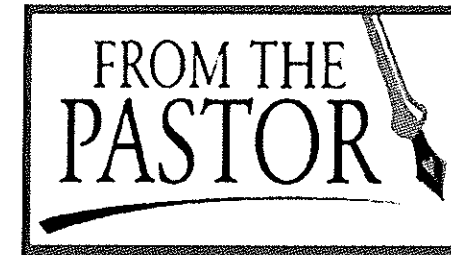
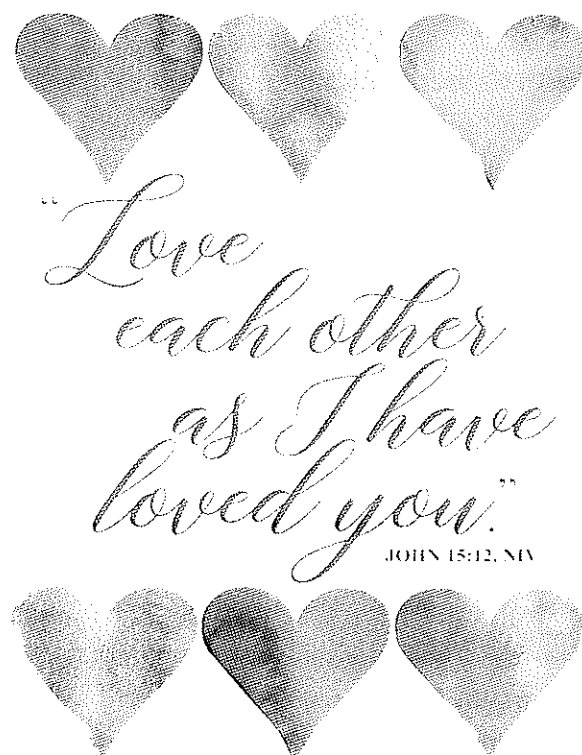

This two-word question is deceptively helpful when trying to achieve clarity among murky circumstances. When overwhelmed, anxious, distracted or disillusioned, asking “what matters” helps cut through the fog & static to clear view and crisp sound.

In April, your council began a conversation we intend to continue with each other and with you. When it comes to being church, what matters? As the body of Christ, what are we about? What do we care about? What and who do we care for? Who are our neighbors to whom we are called to love and serve?

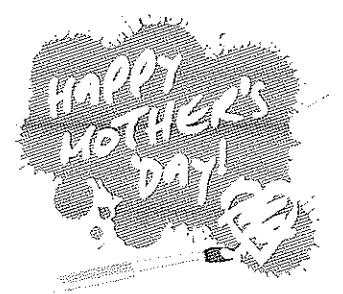
Too often, churches like ours find themselves lost in what is called maintenance mode. We get really good at running through meetings, paying bills, and crossing off checklists as we maintain our various ministries. We become rote in routine in pursuing a status quo. Maintenance ministry looks at the short term and spends resources in reaction to immediate needs. But in all of this, we can get fogged into losing site of our purpose and reason why we are Christ’s church here and now. When becoming tunnel

visioned in maintenance ministry, we lose sight of the mission ministry God has called us into.

In the coming months, you are going to be invited to participate in mission visioning. In mission visioning, we intentionally suspend our maintenance ministry thinking and take purposeful time and effort answering God’s call for us by discussing “what matters”. Mission ministry views the church in the long-term. Rather than spending resources for the short-term, mission ministry invests its gifts for the future God prepares for us to live into.

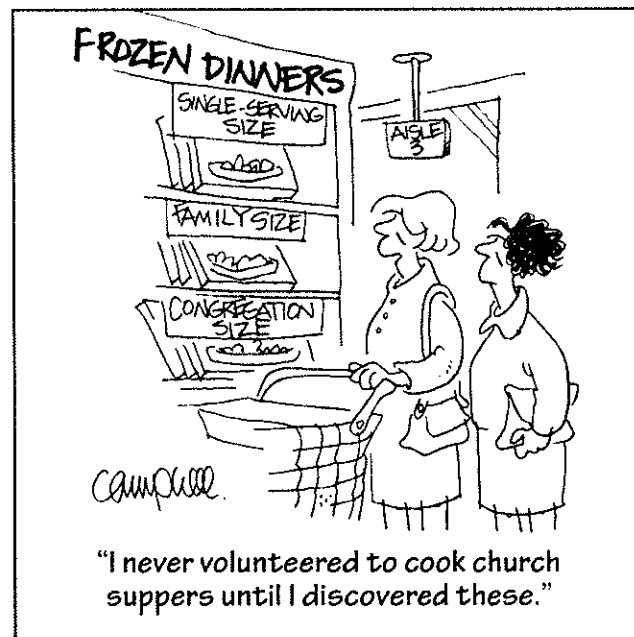
Some of this mission visioning practice will be very low key - such as jotting down a few notes during worship and passing them on. Other opportunities will be more robust, such as an afternoon or evening of conversation and discussion. The important thing for you is to participate, engage in the discussion, and share your thoughts on our future ministry together about “what matters”.

We are Christ’s body, risen for God’s mission in central Wisconsin, and that certainly matters.

## NORTH NEW HOPE WELCA NEWS

### Phebe and Curran Solar Power Challenge

The PV for Phebe Challenge proved to be a success in establishing solar power in the Phebe Hospital in Liberia. The solar panels are expected to save Phebe Hospital about \$35,000 a year. Our WELCA gifts of over \$600,000 and volunteer labor helped make this happen.

Last Nov. a group of Women of the ELCA representatives traveled to Curran Hospital in rural northern Liberia, and saw the hospital's need for solar generated power. The hospital was built in 1924 and has 125 beds and outpatient services. It provides health care for 23 communities. As Phebe did, Curran must use costly backup diesel generators when the electricity supply fails.

The WELCA representative met with the local women there for prayer and Bible study, which gives them strength and support to serve others and God. The Liberian women are committed to encouraging the next generation to get involved by asking them to plan social events, coordinate speakers on interesting topics, and providing leadership roles. The next challenge will be to help provide solar power to the Curran Hospital.

### Youth Gathering Exhibit

A steady stream of energized teens and adult leaders moved through the Women of the ELCA human trafficking exhibit space of the 2015 Youth Gathering in Detroit. They had hundreds of hygiene items to be assembled by youth for giveaway to local agencies, some serving homeless youth. This exhibit displayed how homeless teens are especially vulnerable to sex trafficking.

The display also showed that there is no socioeconomic thread among trafficked victims.

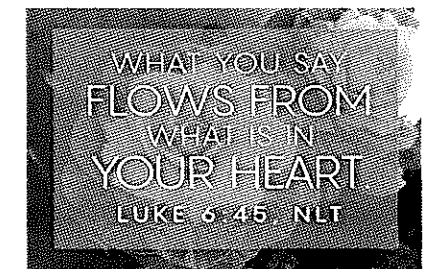
WELCA donated more than \$10,000 to purchase hygiene products for the project.

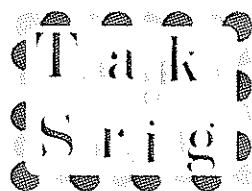

There are two ways you may contribute if you wish:

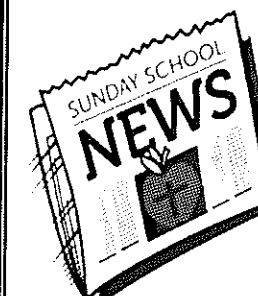

### ORAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

April is oral cancer National Awareness Month. Here is some information from the "Cancer Center" and "Oral Cancer Foundation" website:

Oral cancer begins in the mouth, also called the oral cavity. This includes the lips, the inside lining of the lips and cheeks, the teeth, the gums, most of the tongue, the bottom of the mouth, and the bony roof of the mouth, or hard palate.

In addition, oral cancer can also develop in the throat, the part of the throat that is just behind the mouth. When cancer occurs here, it is called oropharyngeal cancer or throat cancer, and can include the back of the tongue, the back of the roof of the mouth, the tonsils, and the walls of the upper throat.

The oral cavity and oropharynx are key to the healthy functioning of the body. They help us breathe, eat and speak. Salivary glands in the oral cavity start breaking down food as we chew, an essential part of digestion. Cancer can develop in any part of the oral cavity. Because each part of the oral cavity is different, oral cancer encompasses a wide variety of cancer types that are treated in different ways.

The earliest signs of oral cavity and oropharyngeal cancer may be mistaken for other problems, such as a toothache or cold. If symptoms persist for several days or weeks, it is important to see your doctor so that, if oral cancer is present, it can be diagnosed as soon as possible. Many of these symptoms can be due to other, less serious problems or other cancers.

Anyone can get oral cancer, however some factors may increase your likelihood of developing the disease. As with many cancers, the risk of developing oral cancer increases with age. Men are twice as likely to develop oral cancer as women, with most people being over the age of 55. Tobacco use and alcohol consumption are widely considered to be the major risk factors.

### Cigarettes

Male cigarette smokers have a relative risk for oral cancer 27.7 times greater than that of a male never smoker; the rates among women who smoked were nearly 6 times greater. Estimates of the percentage of oral cancers attributable to cigarette smoking have been quite consistent, generally ranging from 75% to 90%.

Numerous studies have examined the relative risk for oral cancer among former smokers have found that the risk for oral cancer was lower among former smokers after the first few years of abstinence than for those who continued to smoke. These studies have found that after 3 to 5 years of smoking abstinence, oral cancer risk decreased by about 50%.

### Cigars and Pipes

Although cigarette smoking is the form of tobacco use most often linked with increased incidence of oral cancer, regular use of pipes or cigars also increases the risk of disease. Cigarette smoking is a major cause of cancers of the oral cavity in the United States. Individuals who smoke pipes or cigars experience a risk for oral cancer similar to that of the cigarette smoker.

### Smokeless Tobacco (Snuff and Chewing Tobacco)

For long-term users there was a 50-fold increased risk for cancer of the gum and buccal mucosa.

### Alcohol

All three forms of alcohol (beer, hard liquor, and wine) have been associated with oral cancer, although hard liquor and beer have a higher associated risk.

### Diet

Low beta-carotene intake has been associated with an increased risk of lung, laryngeal, gastric, ovarian, breast, cervical, and oral cancers. Several studies have shown that a low intake of fruits and vegetables, which are the primary sources of beta-carotene, is also related to a generalized increased cancer risk and mortality. Conversely, an increased consumption of fruits and/or vegetables has been associated with a decreased risk of oral or oropharyngeal cancer when compared with low intake levels.

A low intake of vitamin C has been associated with an increased risk of cancers of the stomach, esophagus, oral cavity, larynx, and cervix. Patients who ingest high levels of vitamin C and fiber have half the risk of oral cancer as those with the lowest level of consumption.

The most consistent dietary findings across multiple cultural settings are that high fruit consumption has a protective effect and that high alcohol consumption has a carcinogenic effect.

### Dental Factors

There is little evidence to suggest that poor oral hygiene, improperly fitting dental prostheses, defective dental restorations, or misaligned or sharp teeth promotes oral cancer.

As with any cancer, early detection is so important. If you have any symptoms or concerns please see your health care provider.

Guest speakers on hunger and poverty were Jill Hicks: Poverty & Prevention Partnership of Portage County; Rachel Sheets: School Social worker in Wis. We all learned a great deal about the needs of Portage County regarding Hunger and Poverty and that we can all do something about it as advocates for others in our society.

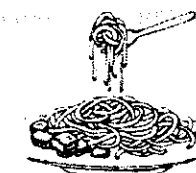
